This year has been unique and it has provided me with the opportunity to make new friends and strengthen ongoing relationships. But most of all it was an inspiring experience to be a part of the ongoing work of SecondFirst Church. I've been amazed by the countless hours and deep commitment of our congregation and staff.

ANNUAL REPORT FROM STAFF

ASSISTANT PASTOR OF MEMBER CARE & NEIGHBORHOOD CONNECTIONS SUBMITTED BY BECKY ERBE

As I write this, I am in my office at church. I am the only one here and the silence is deafening. I can't wait until the halls and offices will be busy again, and our Sanctuary full. In the meantime, you are all in my prayers, and I think of each and every one of you often.

This truly has been an unusual year between Rev. Rebecca's brain injury and a pandemic. But though it all our church is still thriving and we have accomplished so many things.

Serious Soup averaged 80 guests on Mondays. Guests enjoyed hors d'oeuvres, three, sometimes four choices of soup, an entrée, sides, salad and dessert. As the pandemic began, we served brown bags for a few weeks, until virus numbers in our city began to rise. We have temporarily suspended Serious Soup until after Rockford hits its peak in cases. Then hopefully we can go back to serving warm brown bag meals. Thank you to everyone who has made soup, desserts, breads and meals. Thank you to all the volunteers who came on Mondays to help serve our guests. The meals are so much appreciated not only for nourishment, but for the fellowship as well.

We opened the Rockford Overnight Café on January 6 serving a total of 154 people. We averaged about 50 guests a night. Our peak number was 78 guests when the temperature was the coldest. It was a good experience and we will have even a better experience next year. The best part of the Café were the relationships made with the guests. Enclosed in this report is a detailing of the Overnight Café.

Throughout the past year we have performed some weddings and said goodbye to others. We have greeted new families and have welcomed back home returning families.

Professionally I have taken on a few extra roles. I serve on the Committee on Ministry for the Prairie Association of the UCC. I lead three worships a month in two Senior Living facilities. The most rewarding though is serving SecondFirst church as your Associate Pastor.

Overnight Café

- Number of total guests served: 154
- Number of guests taking showers (and towels, receiving new socks, underwear and hygiene kits): 359
- Number of guests receiving clothing items: 98
- Number of guests receiving outwear (coats, hats, gloves, hand warmers): 54
- 56 nights and mornings of meals served.









ANNUAL REPORT FROM STAFF DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Through the church's support, our music program has continued its legacy of strength and flexibility. Although the challenges of COVID-19 have altered the complexion of our musical offerings since March 2020, our liturgy remains musically supported through performances on piano, organ, guitar, solo vocal, and bell music offered by our wonderful staff.

Choir, Vocal Music

The Sanctuary Choir has been actively presenting music in support of liturgy from August through Pentecost throughout most of its history. As in previous years, the Sanctuary Choir has sung on all major liturgical Holy Days and most Sundays when bell groups are not performing. The choir sang with harp, clarinet, and strings for the Christmas service, a service for which music is arranged by the choir director of chamber orchestra or variations thereof. COVID-19 halted the contributions of our singers due to safety concerns; subsequent support vocally has been provided by individual singers and duos in isolation. Vocal soloists, such as Dorothy Paige-Turner, Elizabeth O'Leary, Nora Maynard, and our wonderful church secretary, Debbie Wise, have also provided their gifts to worship in this past year.

Handbells Under the astute leadership of Director of Handbell Ministries Julie Cook Ramirez, Carillons Director Joyce Zartman, and Peanuts Director Sarah Hallberg, the SecondFirst Handbell Program had a successful, albeit truncated year. In addition to contributing music to numerous worship services, we presented "A Very Carly Christmas" on December 14th. Turnout was great, and donations totaled just over \$1,700. Thank you to all the ringers, directors, and audience members who helped us raise such a significant amount, which was put to good use by Carly Rice and her team, helping Rockford's underserved population. The Ring in Spring was poised to benefit CASA, and all the ensembles were hard at work on their selections when the coronavirus outbreak put a hold on all church activities. The program year ended early and the concert was postponed. When it is safe for us to reconvene, we will reconnect with CASA with the intent of having a future concert benefit their organization.

Organ and Piano

Organ repairs that had been delayed due to the health of the technicians were finally completed by Fabry, Inc., in January and February of 2020. The following items were addressed:

- 1. Re-leathering water damage reed chests
- 2. Installed stronger pouch strings on two reed pipes
- 3. Repair of the 16 ft. Bourdon pipe

These repairs allow the organist to use some stops which have needed to be avoided. The most important repair was of the 16 ft. Bourdon, a flute pipe that is probably used more than any other pipe in a great deal of solo literature. It is an essential voice in not only solo music, but also in important parts of congregational song, like the Doxology, Gloria Patri, and hymns.

Hymns, accompaniments, and wonderful solo works for piano and organ continue to be expertly and beautifully provided by the inimitable Valerie Blair. Bob Bates, organist emeritus, has contributed to our worship several times over the past year.

As my second full year at SecondFirst began, I took on the role of both the Family and Youth Director positions, merging the roles as best I could to meet the current needs of our community. I have loved getting to know the families and young faces of our church better, especially as my own young daughters began their first season in Peanut Bell Ringers. Throughout this year, the church has been able to keep up old traditions, support some new fun projects, and continue to support through the unforeseen crisis of Covid 19.

Trunk or Treat

We had one of the highest attended and most successful Trunk or Treats around. The weather was especially nice that day as many cars lined up, which was not the case on actual Halloween, when it snowed. Our church continues to be a welcoming sign of joy and hope to all through this annual event.

Thanksgiving Reenactment

Alice Uphouse led the reenactment of the five kernels of corn, a story to remind us that we come from people who knew how to find hope and resiliency during hard times. The costumes were dusted off, and the tradition remembered, and who knew how important that lesson would be through the coming times!

Scavenger Hunt, Chopped Competition, and Bowling Oh My!

There were a few new fun family and intergenerational Game Nights this year. Families of all ages gathered for a Chopped Show-style cooking competition. The meals were better than expected and fun was had by all. We also held a photo scavenger hunt across the church and teams took goofy and lovely pictures of themselves in a variety of spaces in our amazing building. Additionally, we continued the tradition of a bowling outing as several families met at Don Carter Lanes for a fun-filled afternoon.

Snow Camp

Snow Camp was a frosty good time, as almost 20 young people ventured north for a weekend of spiritual exploration. The theme was "Gen Z Spirituality", and over the course of the workshops, the youth explored what God meant to them and eventually crafted their own worship service.

Music Videos and Podcasts

In Sunday school, we used some of our time together to create worshipful 21st century content. We found ways to share created content with parents, and at the Pilgrim Potluck.

Covid Support and Resources

During the time of the Shelter in Place order, resources were put in place to support families spiritually during the time of crisis. Weekly emails went out for two months, each with a curated list of activities that reflected both the scripture lesson for the week, as well as the things happening in the world. Additionally, a children-and-teen early worship time on Zoom was created before worship, so families could gather and have some special time to learn about God together. We also began a Facebook Covid 19 group support page for community members to connect with each other through the challenging moments.

Report Summary

Although much of this year may feel overshadowed by the darker days of its end, when I looked through the pictures saved to my phone gallery for this report, it was the many smiling faces that made me realize just what an incredible year we have had. God has continued to bless us with children who learn to grow in faith and carry forward Jesus' work in the world. For that, I know we all say Hallelujah and Amen.









ANNUAL REPORT FROM STAFF DIRECTOR OF THEOLOGICAL ENGAGEMENT

I am filled with gratitude as I look back on the past year and see the wide array of programs offered. I have a deep sense of gratitude for the team that carefully and thoughtfully thinks through ideas and topics, and while they occasionally indulge me, keep the congregation on the forefront of their minds. Saint Anselm's motto was faith seeking understanding, which also happens to be the name of my first theology textbook, but never does he wish to replace faith with understanding. Despite the claims of some, there is not a preference for understanding or knowledge over faith. Rather it confronts Anselm's conviction that a faith that "merely believes what it ought to believe" is "dead." Faith was to be an active endeavor grounded in God's active love.

What no annual report can fully capture are forged relationships, holy moments of vulnerability, honest disagreements, and life giving bouts of laughter. Education is truly rooted in connection, and the fabric of this faith community shines through in these gatherings. In the midst of a pandemic that keeps us home, Sunday's Coffee Class has continued to meet providing connection, reflection, and affection. That trio may not be as memorable as Paul's faith, hope, and love, but I wouldn't trade it as the foundation to dig deeper into Paul's writings.

A final word of thanks to those who actually do the work, notably Steve Williams for serving as secretary and keeping the team on track. But more so, the committed and faithful folks listed below who craft wonderful and meaningful sessions. Any congregation that can look at climate change, biblical interpretation, sexuality, and doubt in a single year is doing something right. Understanding is not final for Anselm but understanding brings joy. May all our thoughtful reflection end in that joy.



You probably already know the Deaconess serve up the treats at coffee hour, almost every Sunday. They prepare the luncheons for the funerals (7 luncheons this year). And a few other dinners here and there. The Deaconess work on Serious Soup, with the help of other dedicated volunteers, who are not Deaconess, Serious Soup has been serving soup on Mondays since 2018. So, seriously, there are about 14 of us and usually there are at least eight of us each Monday to set up, prepare, serve soup and clean up. But that's not all, there are more of you, who have prepared soup, desserts, and other delicious offerings to serve at the meal. In one year there have been 1380 quarts of soup (345 gal.) to ladle into the bowls. And there are many words of Thank you, Mmmmm, that was good, God Bless.

As of March 23, 2020 there was a need to get a meal ready for Monday, even though we could not let people in the church. There were approx. 55 meals handed out (brown bag) the first Monday after the "stay-at home" order. And 30 meals the next Monday. We are planning this week to week. We need to be aware of the risk week to week.


Previously our church teams have spent the past few years developing four strategies which were adopted church-wide, and the goals each team set to accomplish this.

The Mission Ministry Team supports its members through shared participation in its activities, and connects the Church to the wider community both within and beyond its walls.

We fulfill the Church's Mission Statement through four broad areas of activity:

- » Developing and maintaining direct relationships with Rockford Mission Partners.
- » Providing direct aid to individual neighbors.
- » Working with the Congregation to carry out programs beyond our direct relationships.
- » Aiding our Denominations in accomplishing their broader programs.

We've provided direct involvement in and/or monetary support for these Mission Partners:

- » The ARC we open our gym and supply snacks and craft activities to support their regular Rec Nights.
- » Jeremiah Development we supply office space and a monthly contribution, along with volunteers at Love Rockford and earth and laborers for the community garden.
- » Rockford Urban Ministries we join the community in supporting this multidenominational outreach and social justice effort.

- » Fairgrounds Boys and Girls Club where we partner in a multi-denominational mentoring program.

We've provided direct support to our neighbors through:

- » Neighbor care, including showers, diapers, clothing, travel assistance.
- » Funding for Serious Soup

We've worked together to further broaden congregational programs:

- » Managed the Rockford Overnight Café. We were joined in funding and staffing this by many of our community and governmental neighbors.
- » Jubilee Center soup kitchen, where members and friends serve six Saturday meals annually.

This year the Trustee Ministry Team's main focus beyond taking care of our building and the safety of our programing, has been making room for KFACT. Pastor Rebecca presented space for them as an opportunity for our church. We accepted and launched a project to clear Emerson Hall and begin renovations of this part of the building. Replacing the windows has been the most amazing change. We all had a chance to see these renovations during KFACT's open house. THANKS to Bob Langford (Trustees) and Jennifer Archer and Karen Olson (Building Use Task Force) and all their team members for getting us off to a great start last year! Thanks to all of you for your help and understanding throughout this process.

Of equal importance has been the work organized by Bill Hoff and the Foundation last summer, to repair our Church Bell Tower and major areas of the roof. This spring we will see the mounting of our Mural on the exterior west wall of the Gym. Trustees had church financial processes audited and we passed with praise and few recommendations. A long-range building and décor taskforce have formed to plan for maintenance and updating our facilities. We did a Stain Glass Window audit for maintenance and renovation. We will be monitoring the City's plan to change N. Main and Church streets to two-way traffic.

Trustees are responsible for the safe and appropriate use of our building, for example: Serious Soup, Rockford Overnight Café, Bridge Clinic, KFACT, Love Rockford, Thrift Shop, Just Goods. Trustees, Governing Council and Staff have watched for Covid-19 recommendations and promptly made changes throughout our operations to keep us safe. Alice Uphouse has summarized (below) our projects for the year. These renovations were financed by a grant of \$140,000 from the Second Congregational Church Foundation. We have \$16,000 remaining in that fund after the work completed to date.

Emerson Hall and some of **Gordon Chapel** now have new windows. Offices for KFACT staff now have a fresh coat of paint and new flooring. Bathrooms have new toilets and paint. The Kitchen has refinished cabinets, newer stove and refrigerator, and new faucet in the sink. The balcony has a new railing on the upper east wall to protect the new windows. Office area lighting is new, and internet service has been added.

The new **Kids Zone** is on Third Floor, just off the sanctuary balcony and the elevator. This area received new flooring, fresh paint and stalls in the bathrooms. Counters now have granite tops that add a great look and functionality. At the Kids Zone open house you would have seen their new furniture and area rugs. We are still working on details to make this an extra-safe zone.

Our **Bell Choirs** now occupy the fourth floor Reed Chapel 'Bell Room'. This area has painting and new floor to be completed this spring, after the end of Bells' season. New bookcases and file cabinets, new lighting and table covers are all part of the renovation for our bells!

Clearing out Emerson Hall: Moving out the many 'storage' areas in the great room and offices in Emerson Hall was the largest task. Moving the White Chapel English Handbells was a task requiring many hands. All of the historical documents, enhancements used for the liturgical seasons, the hand puppets and all those custom costumes found new homes We all came together as a church family to accomplish these tasks.
