she said, then added, "I'm sure the neighbors are really grateful too." Craigo-Snell joined the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary faculty in 2011 as a constructive systematic theologian. Her most recent book is "Disciplined Hope: Prayer, Politics and Resistance."

Our congregation members have raised nearly \$11,000 for the CROP Hunger Walk this fall thus overwhelming our goal of \$8,000. That is our best effort ever, beating last year's record of \$7,707. How is this possible? It is mainly due to the efforts of two people, the Rev. Bob Saunders and Janet Hendricks. These two members have raised \$6,785. Bob alone raised \$5,665. How did they do it you ask? They used the old fashioned method of speaking to people face to face. While others, including myself, asked from a distance using the internet, they were bold enough to do it in person. Thank you, Janet and Bob, along with everyone who helped raise funds to feed others in Rockford and beyond.

But wait - there is even more. The Mission Ministry Team pledged to match up to \$2,000. Therefore our congregation has given \$13,073 this year. Way to go Church!

NOVEMBER UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

The church now has water. As stated last month we never lost water to the sprinklers or the gym restrooms. The new two inch copper piping has been connected to the water supply that is used in the gym. Carpet squares have been selected for the floor covering that was destroyed. Installation will be starting soon. Help will be needed to move items back to the Historian's Room and the old office after the carpet is installed. If you are willing to help, please call the office and request that your name be put on a list to call when it is time to return the items.

A heat circulation pump gasket went bad and caused a leak in the third floor mechanical room above the Gathering Place Room. Unfortunately the leak dripped through the ceiling on to the table and the floor. Two ceiling tiles were destroyed. Thanks to Alice Uphouse and Mary Spindler for discovering the leak and keeping the damage to a minimum. The pump gasket was replaced and Duraclean dried and cleaned everything. The table is fine. The Trustees have agreed to get leak detectors for all the mechanical rooms.

Many other items have been repaired or replaced for a complete list of Trustees activities please look at the meeting minutes in the office.

Please note that the church is no longer collecting batteries; alkaline batteries can now be put in the garbage. Rechargeable Batteries can be taken to Battery Plus or Best Buy. Do not put them in the garbage or the recycle bin. Rechargeable Batteries have caused fires.



Why learn Lift Every Voice and Sing?

This is a song known as the Black national anthem. Written first as a poem by James Weldon Johnson, then set to music by his brother J. Rosamund Johnson, and first performed by elementary students in Jacksonville, Florida in 1900, this is a song that has truly had a life of its own. Soon after the performance, the Johnson brothers moved to New York and gave no more thought to the song. But the text and tune were compelling enough, that those children carried the song with them, and spread it to the community and beyond, and taught it to their children, who taught it to theirs, and it eventually became the National Negro Anthem, or National Negro Hymn.

Our exploration of Lift Every Voice and Sing is being bumped to January, as we had a full November with our Remembering Loved Ones, and Bells on Dedication Sunday. And just like that, it is Advent. I hope you look forward to singing familiar Advent hymns, with our usual sneak peek at Christmas. JEREMIAH DEVELOPMENT SAYS THANK YOU!

On September 25th, Jeremiah Development implemented its fourth LOVE Rockford event for the Rockford community. This could not have happened without the tremendous support of the pastors, congregations and community volunteers and agencies. We are grateful for your time, prayers, and support in creating another successful experience. THANK YOU!

Let us give you some information of this event:

- Jeremiah Development, in collaboration with thirty-one agencies and organizations, reached out with support services to the under-served population of Rockford.
- » With three city blocks filled with physical health care, mental health and social service organizations and agencies, this outdoor event fulfilled its goal of creating access to resources, education, and support.
- » While residents connected with local resource organizations, they were also able to have their bike repaired, get a haircut, and choose clothing and winter gear.
- » Hot nutritious lunches were available, as well as fresh produce, protein, and dairy to take home.
- » Flu and Covid vaccinations were given and books for all reading levels were distributed.
- » One-hundred forty-four (144) households registered at the main campus, and one-hundred twenty-four (124) households registered at the drive-thru food distribution site.
- » In total, four-hundred sixty-three (463) individuals were served by this event. In the planning and implementation of LOVE Rockford, we had twenty-four (24) leaders, and multiple subcommittees working to make this event successful and safe.
- » In total, we had eighty-nine (89) volunteers providing 1,094 hours of time, energy, and skill for LOVE Rockford 2021.
