# UCC SEVERE STORMS 2021 APPEAL TO AID DECEMBER TORNADO VICTIMS



In the days since a series of deadly tornadoes swept across six states on Dec. 10, people of the United Church of Christ have reached out to respond.

Donations are being directed to the church's Severe Storms 2021 appeal, as Disaster Ministries works with Conference disaster coordinators to assess the damages and discern how best to help.

At least 90 people died in the destructive Friday-night

storms, 80 of them in Kentucky. In Edwardsville, III., six people were killed when a tornado knocked down the walls and took the roof off an Amazon warehouse. Four people in Tennessee were killed, as well as two in Arkansas and two in Missouri. *Read more: www.ucc.org*

"Life's most persistent and urgent question is: What are you doing for others?" said Charlotte Hall. It's a question the elder and chair of the outreach committee of Swarthmore Presbyterian Church doesn't ask alone.

Located in a suburb outside of Philadelphia, the 675-member church is constantly seeking

ways to engage with its community. Among those ways is taking seriously the call to serve that marks the national celebration of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday.

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was born on January 15, 1929. In 1983, legislation was signed to make his birthday a federal holiday. Three years later, in January 1986, Americans first observed what would become known as "MLK Day." Then, in 1994, Congress designated the federal holiday as a national Day of Service and charged AmeriCorps, a national nonprofit that sends volunteers to areas of need, with leading this effort. *Read more: presbyterianmission.org*

Hello Church!

Happy New Year! Maybe? I hope? Questions abound as we head into this new year. What will it look like? What will Covid-19 do? How will we have to respond? I don't know about you, but I don't like uncertainty. Our study of the Gospel of John on Sundays in worship (and Tuesday noon Bible

studies) comes at the right time. From the sermon on Sunday, December 19:

We have been walking through the Old Testament this Fall, and recently through the prophets. We get a sense that the family faith (and by extension us) are just not getting the right picture; just not quite understanding what God is wanting us to do. There is violence and war and exile, and promise and hope, and uncertainty and doubt, and love and fear. It's all getting a bit complicated. The Gospel of John speaks right to the heart of that complicated, overwhelmed feeling, that feeling that can make us feel dumb at times because we just can't quite grasp the way God wants us to be, know and act. The Gospel of John starts over using the words of Genesis. In the beginning. In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God. A new start. A fresh beginning. One that has grace upon grace.

May we take God up on the grace of a new start, a fresh beginning this year. We may not know what the year will look like, but we know that God is with us and that we can do this year together as church.

### **GOVERNING COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

December 7, 2021

- » Pastor Becky reminded us about Remembrance Sunday on December 12th. The Festival of Lights outing went well. Prayer Stations will start Christmas week. Serious Soup has restarted.
- » Reverend Rebecca is busy with Advent. She has been visiting care facilities. She is grateful for staff, lay leaders and volunteers.
- » Treasurer John DeWaters reported that we will probably end the year with a black number, primarily due to credits from the Presbytery for Rebecca's injury. The number of people pledging this year is down. The Stewardship Committee will be making phone calls. The Budget Committee will be meeting. John suggested we develop a 5–10-year plan to prepare for the continued decline that is affecting all mainline churches.
- » Trustees Financial Comments and Report on Building Use.
- » Trustees Chair Jim Delmore asked for a blessing to all those who have money to the Foundation. We have used Foundation money to pay for several unplanned expenses. The water leak problems have been resolved and damage done by the problems have been fixed or will be fixed soon. Other items that need repairing include the heat exchange HVAC and a valve in the water system boiler. The mural has been fixed. A new water heater in Emerson has been installed. We need to replace the water softener for the kitchen.

#### Old Business

» A letter explaining Becoming a Mathew 25 Congregation will be sent to the congregation.

#### New Business

- » Ministry Team chairs are asked to ask eligible people on their teams if they are willing to continue and submit any ideas for new people to the nominating team.
- » The Executive Committee has created the new position of Church Administrator. It is a 11-12 hour per week unpaid position for 6 months. It will be re-evaluated in 6 months. It will provide administrative support. Bob Langford has volunteered to take on this position. He will be sitting in on staff meetings, Governing Council, Executive Committee, Trustees and any other teams as needed. He suggested inviting all past moderators to a meal to share the history of the church.
- » 1 Minute Ministry Team Highlights
- » Deacons Pumpkin bars were well received. They will hand out Christmas cookies December 19 and are helping Mary Spindler decorate the Sanctuary.
- » Worship Music and Arts they are reading Next Worship about how to increase diversity in worship. They are discussing the Director of Music position and what it will entail.
- » DVT they have finished Belonging interviews and are looking at data and next steps.
- » Church Administrator Bob Langford shared that he should be treated as a staff member.
- » Missions the boots have been delivered to Haskell.
- » The next Governing Council meeting will be January 27, 2022 via Zoom.



### FROM THE ORGAN BENCH By Valerie Blair

Picking up from the introduction to the SecondFirst pipe organ, this will be a series going through the various parts of the organ. Organs are made up of 4 basic components: the console, pipes, wind generator, and action. Consoles generally have between two to five manuals (keyboards), with ours having four. The pipes are classified as either flues or reeds, and range in size from a few inches to 32 feet high. Flues are hollow pipes with an opening in the side that makes the sound, and reeds have a piece of metal attached to the pipe that vibrates to create the sound. The action connects all the parts and makes the organ work; it is mechanical, pneumatic, electric, or electropneumatic. The wind generator blows pressurized air into the instrument, so that when a stop is pulled at the console, air is allowed into those pipes, and will sound when I press a key on that manual. That is the basic functioning of the instrument. More to come in the next newsletter.

The music this month will include Carillons and the return of the "Church Street String Band." At the time of writing this, I am hopeful that Syncronia will be playing on the 16th. This is the violin duo scheduled in October, but had to postpone due to a broken arm. Nicolai Janitzky, a baritone who sings in the Lyric Opera Chorus has agreed to sing and hopes travel remains open from Germany. So the plan as it looks now, but may change:

Last month we mentioned the mechanical room leak on the third floor that destroyed some ceiling panels in the Gathering Place Room. The ceiling panels have been replaced and a cover has been installed over some exposed plumbing. Leak detectors for all the mechanical rooms are still being evaluated.

The carpet has been installed in the old office and the Historian's Room/first floor Brides Room. If you are willing to help Alice Uphouse put things back, please call Alice or the office and request that your name be put on a

list to call when it is time to return the items.

The mural looks like new; the three damaged mural panels have been replaced. Extra bracing has been added. If you have not seen the mural lately it looks just as beautiful in the winter as in the summer.

Work will start on the installation of the new video system soon. The building diagrams have been looked at and a potential cable path has been found. The plan is not to have any exposed wires that will detract from beautiful

If you have noticed that the sanctuary is cooler than normal it is not because we are trying to save money. Which is a good idea; however that is not why it is cooler. The heat exchanger has had a weld go bad causing other problems with the furnace. We are waiting to find out when a new heat exchanger can be installed. Sadly the commercial Trane

### A NOTE FROM DVT (DISCERNMENT AND VISION TEAM)

Becoming a Matthew 25 Church

As chair of DVT, I am thrilled to lead our discussions on our two major themes for this year, Belonging and Diversity. We are now going through all the data (your thoughts and ideas) that was gathered during our congregational interviews. Thank you for your support for that project, your participation was at an incredible level.

As we began our research on diversity, materials were available to us from both UCC and the PC(USA). In particular, the PC(USA)'s Matthew 25 Church initiative drew our attention. What is a Matthew 25 church? Per the PC(USA)'s website "Matthew 25:31-46 calls us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities." But what exactly does that mean?

There are three pathways to become a Matthew 25 church.

- 1. The first is to "Building Congregational Vitality", to work on increasing spiritual strength and mission. For instance, Tuesday bible study with your senior pastor, adult educational programs, and obviously mission work. Another aspect of building congregational vitality is to be outward reaching, to follow Jesus' teaching to help the marginalized and suffering. Maybe, an overnight cafe to keep people alive during our cold winters, or some hot warm soup on a Monday afternoon.
- 2. The second pathway is "Dismantling Structural Racism," the unequal access to resources—such as money, education, food, housing—that affect people of color. Maybe, a Bridge Clinic that gives people access to health care, or a garden that provides fresh vegetables, or support of an organization such as Jeremiah Development, maybe, even something as small as boots for kids so they can go outside and play during their school day and be more open to learning.
- 3. "Eradicating Systemic Poverty" is the third pathway. Would that be support for an organization such as KFACT? Or even something as simple as a Thrift Store providing clothing for someone going on a job interview.

Our church is a member of the Presbytery of Blackhawk, which is a Matthew 25 Presbytery. To read more about what it means to be a Matthew 25 church, go to <a href="https://www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/matthew-25/">https://www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/matthew-25/</a>

DVT determined that we are indeed a Matthew 25 church, at least in spirit. What did we need to do to formally become one? Simply register and state our intent to continue to work on these initiatives. It is not necessary for us to work on all three initiatives continually, but to declare an effort to continue to strive to reach the goals that Jesus challenged us with. PC(USA) would also like us to share our stories, to let them know what we are doing and what we hope to accomplish.

DVT unanimously voted to bring to the Governing Council a request to become a Matthew 25 church. After discussion at the Governing Council level, it was decided to initially educate the congregation about being a Matthew 25 church prior to this council vote so that you as members would have an understanding of the initiative and an opportunity to express your views or concerns. #### STEWARDSHIP STATEMENT

Back in 2006 I was fleeing an episcopal denomination I had been a member of, off and on, my entire life. The break had come when the local church, for years a strong and faithful supporter of the denomination, had to reassess its ability to continue to support its hierarchy financially at the requested level. In a confrontation with their representative, we stated that far from continuing to support them, we now needed their assistance. We were flatly rejected.

Adding to my sense of alienation was my growing perception that from our Bishop on down to the retired pastors among us, there was a failure to see us, the parishioners, as the "church". Rather, I felt, there was a glass ceiling between us in the pews and the men and women who compromised the episcopal structure, who saw themselves as the embodiment and protectors of the "church". So, I went church shopping. When I came to (then) Second Congregational Church in 2006, I quickly had a couple of encounters with Carl Dickow that cemented my commitment here. First, he immediately introduced himself to me, and learned enough about me to establish a link (we're both CPAs). The next Sunday, when he saw me enter the sanctuary with the furtive glance of every visitor trying to avoid notice, he called out and patted the pew next to him, "here, come sit here with me". I was instantly transformed; I had a home here.

A couple of Sundays later, Bob Bates was playing one of his magnificent postludes. Carl said "come on, let's go up and watch him play". I was horrified – he was suggesting we go up on the raised dais, the lair of the lofty rulers of the church, that "priests only" place! As we approached the rail overlooking Bob, Carl said "don't worry. We own the church". Wow! Not the denomination itself, not the episcopate, not a local Bishop. Us. I was all in then and there.

I quickly found out that my sense of ownership came with concomitant responsibility. If we're going to own this church, we have to take care of it. We're a representative democracy, and most of us know how persuasive the Nominations Team can be. Sooner or later (but mostly sooner) we're going to be asked to serve it with our time, talent and treasure. And we really can't refuse: This is our church in a more profound way than any I have ever attended. So, I've accepted minor leadership responsibilities for most of the fifteen years I've called SecondFirst home.

And it's all Carl's fault.
