FEBRUARY UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

The main focus of the meeting was on the budget. John DeWaters our Treasure reported that financially we are stable and December has been a surprisingly good month and we ended the year in the black this is in part because we have received credit from the Board of Pensions for the disability payments made by the church. After the report we reviewed the proposed budget and voted to accept the budget as presented. Before the budget is presented to the congregation the Governing Council has to approve it. The budget process was not a week or two but months spent reviewing income and expenditures for the last five years. As you know the last two years have not been normal. The Finance Committee also provided guidance. Pledging is so important to the budgeting process. The work done by the Stewardship Committee was so important for the planning of the budget. The Budget Committee, Finance Committee and the Stewardship Committee spent many hours working to make certain that our church will be strong and vibrant for years to come. I would like to thank all three committees for their hard work.

OVERNIGHT CAFÉ UPDATE

The Rockford Overnight Café has been amazing this year, offering shelter to our most vulnerable citizens on bitter cold nights. We have encouraged people to begin again and supported them in their time of weakness.

Consistent with everything in our COVID-traumatized society, our guests this year have been more difficult to handle. We hear the same stories from social service agencies in town.

We believe the Café needs to have greater organizational structure with a more professionally-trained staff. Therefore, your Executive Committee made the difficult but necessary decision to close the Café, a couple weeks early.

We accomplished our objective of providing people with warmth and shelter on the coldest nights. Thank you so much for the myriad of ways you have supported the Café. We have much work and discerning to do in the off season with the hope that the Café will be back next year better than ever.

First the Interviews ... now the start of some exciting opportunities (Save the Dates!)

As outlined in Karen's article in this Tower, the Discernment and Vision Team (DVT) has begun the process of determining themes from your responses to our interviews and our response to them. A major theme that emerged is that we are connected to the church, most often by our personal contacts/ activities with other members. There was some concern about the effects of COVID on this connectedness. Secondly, we saw the need for growth in membership, and particularly with younger members. These themes are equally important and we think that the answer to the concerns may be related. If we increased opportunities for members to be connected, might we also use these same opportunities to increase growth? After worship on Sunday April 3, DVT will host a brainstorming group in the dining room to develop ideas for activities that promote both connectedness and growth.

While we felt connected through our Ministry Team activities, the positions on those teams have become more difficult to fill and there is concern about burnout of the members who have filled these positions for many years. On Sunday March 27, Rev. Molly Carlson, the conference minister of the Illinois Conference of the UCC will be delivering our sermon. Immediately after worship, she will lead us in a discussion about different ways to structure the church hierarchy which may help to reduce this burnout and increase our efficiency. DVT invites all who are interested in these topics to these meetings to learn and grow together.

In October the Discernment and Vision Team launched an ambitious effort to interview as many of the congregation as possible on the topic of Belonging. The survey consisted of three inquiries:

- » Tell us about a time when you felt connected to the church.
- » What hopes do you have for our future?

» What concerns do you have that may be in our way? In addition, respondents were asked to share any thoughts they had that were not touched upon by the three.

The response far surpassed the team's expectations; 75% of SecondFirst members participated in an interview. The following is a summary of those responses, which will be grouped in themes that emerged from analysis - Connecting through Activities, Mission/Service, Growth/Finances, Leadership.

To the first prompt, many members felt strong connections through activities (serving on committees, the music program, coffee class, all-church picnic) and missions (Serious Soup, Jeremiah Development, Fair Trade). For some it was the joining of First Presbyterian with Second Congregational and the mutual commitment through the Federation that made them feel most connected. For others it was a lifelong connection growing up in the church family.

In describing hopes for the future, a number of responses related to the current Covid crisis and its impact on growth in membership. Specific needs included invitations to youth and younger members, as well as a continuing emphasis on the church's outreach in the community.

When responding to the question regarding concerns that might impede our progress, "lack of growth" was the most frequent response. Members readily shared their concerns ranging from our worship service (seen as traditional and needing diversity in worship leaders) to our location and building use to nurturing relationships in which opinions and ideas are given a greater voice. Others expressed concern over the number of people involved in the work of the church and the need to broaden that base so as not to cause "burnout" in our hardworking congregants. Covid was a persistent issue as was a reluctance to change.

Responders were able to add personal thoughts in a final prompt about their expectations when they received the interview request. Many had no additional thoughts but were pleased to have been asked. Other responses centered on service concerns (outdoor and online services, sermon content, music) as well as membership concerns (need for more activities, meeting spiritual needs, attracting new members). Membership concerns led to concerns regarding the financial impact of fewer members.

As DVT moves forward celebrating the strengths highlighted in the interviews and addressing the challenges facing SecondFirst, the sincerity and candor of our respondents will provide the foundation for our next steps and is gratefully appreciated.

STAFF REPORTS

- » Pastor Becky shared positive information about the Overnight Café. We've served more people than ever, and donations are coming in.
- » Reverend Rebecca praised our wonderful staff who continue to find creative ways to fix things and discover problems before they worsen. She is planning programs for Lent.
- » Treasurer John DeWaters shared budget information and answered questions. It was moved and seconded that the Budget be accepted. Motion carried.
- » Trustees Financial Comments and Report on Building Use Chairperson Jim Delmore reported on repairs being made and repairs needed. They are surveying the building and making a prioritized list of building repairs needed. We will be leasing a new copier. The lease agreement will include supplies and repairs.

ONGOING BUSINESS

- » It was moved, seconded, and passed that we become a Matthew 25 congregation.
- » The Covid Committee reported that the Budget meeting will be in person and on Zoom. We will continue to ask people testing positive for Covid to quarantine for at least ten days.
- » The Nominating Committee reported that several teams are filling up, but members are still needed on DVT, Family Christian Education, and Missions.

NEW BUSINESS

- » The Budget meeting and Fudge Sunday will be February 13th.
- » It was moved, seconded, and passed that the Governing Council purchase the Courageous Economy webinar.
- » The Music Director Search Committee will be meeting soon. Valerie has agreed to stay on as interim for six months.
- » 1 Minute Ministry Team Highlights
- » Worship, Music, and Arts Jim Burright reported they are discussing diversity in worship
- » Deacons Linda Oshita reported Christmas cookies were well received and fudge will be handed out February 13th. The church picnic will be August 21st.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE MODERATOR by Katy Paterson

A year and a half ago I was diagnosed with cancer. Fortunately my church family lifted my spirits as I came to terms with this horrible disease. I received cards, notes, emails, phone calls, flowers, gifts, visits, and most important prayers. I still have an overflowing basket of cards and notes which I keep on my dresser as a reminder of the kindness of our congregation.

After several months of treatment, which luckily had few side effects for me, I actually felt pretty good. I felt comfortable returning to helping with Serious Soup. Of course Serious Soup under the able leadership of Arlene Noel with a great bunch of volunteers had been going on just fine without me. As we chatted and worked at Serious Soup we realized how many of us had

been through cancer treatment. As we talked I found the support from these ladies so valuable. Several months later, when another church member, who had been sending me supportive emails, was also diagnosed with cancer, I urged her to come down on Monday mornings and talk with us. She came several times and recently told us how much talking to us had helped her.

Early in my term as moderator, I met with Rebecca and told her about our informal cancer support group on Monday mornings in the kitchen. She and I both thought lay led interest groups for church members would be a wonderful idea. I've found that being a moderator is a time-consuming but very rewarding job. I'm sorry to say I haven't acted on the idea.

At a DVT meeting recently I found out that there are several of us interested in a book club. Perhaps now is the time to start some groups. Groups would be made up of people with a common interest. The activities, time and place for meetings, meeting in person or by Zoom, how often to meet, would all be determined by the people in the group. These groups could be for support, education and/or socializing.

We have pallets we will be turning into bookshelves once we learn how.
- » Bingo Oak Street Health is hosting a neighborhood bingo game once a month. This is a great opportunity for our seniors in the neighborhood to come together. The isolation from this pandemic has been hard on everyone and this gives them a chance to safely be together
- » Neighborhood Events we are having four events for the neighborhood this year.
- Personal safety ADC Givens with the Rockford Police Department and Brandon Burke our community service officer will give a presentation of personal and property safety. Everyone attending will receive a "screamer" and learn how and when to use it.
- Fire safety The Rockford Fire Department will teach fire safety and those attending will receive a fire extinguisher, smoke detector, and carbon monoxide detector. They will learn how to use them and where to install them.
- Home Improvement Residents will learn basic home improvement. How to change fuses, where's the water shut off, and what to do when a circuit trips, among other things will be taught. Through discussions with the residents, we learned there is a need for outdoor trash cans with lids to help keep the neighborhood clean. We will distribute trash cans at this time
- A neighborhood Christmas party
- » Movies in the Park We will begin the popular movies in the park when the weather gets warmer
- » LOVE Rockford due to Covid, this year we will be doing 4 smaller LOVE Rockford events each focusing on a specific area. March 5th is the first one and will focus on grandparents raising grandchildren.
- » Jeremiah Helps small engine repair program this new program begins April 4th! Youth ages 14-18 will learn how to tear down and rebuild a small engine. They will be diagnosing and repairing a piece of lawn equipment and will be able to own that equipment when they are done. We are going to need much help with this very important program. Mentors, volunteer coordinator, and meals are just some of the needs we have.
- » Great American Clean-Up we will be walking the

neighborhood cleaning up trash form the neighborhood streets.

- » The Garden every year, we feed the people of the neighborhood fresh produce during the growing season. This continues to be a safe place where community happens and friendships are built between the congregants of the JD churches and the neighbors. We have recently written a grant that will provide funds to make the garden more accessible to our senior neighbors and those with mobility challenges. Stay tuned!
- » Neighborhood Newsletter we continue to deliver a four-page newsletter to every door in the neighborhood once a month throughout the year. This has become an important way to communicate with the residents of the Coronado Haskell Neighborhood.
- » Transformation health focus groups Jeremiah Development is partnering with the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Rockford to help people tell the story of the challenges they have faced accessing health care. These stories will be used to present a picture to our legislatures of the health care challenges in this area.
 - » Connections We have amassed a collection of literature from area social service agencies and have created a library for residents to come, learn what is available for assistance, and get connected.
 - » Family Fun Night JD is hosting monthly game nights for families in the neighborhood. Building strong families is the cornerstone to building a strong community. We hope this will provide opportunities for families to spend time together and build lasting memories.

Jeremiah has been blessed to be the recipient of much support throughout the community. Goodwill Industries of Northern Illinois is supporting our movie in the park nights, the take a book library, and providing games for our family fun nights, Oak Street Health sponsors our newsletter as well as treats for those who deliver the newsletter, we received a \$20,000 grant from the Community Foundation of Northern Illinois for our new Jeremiah Helps program, and a \$50,000 grant from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Illinois to support our neighborhood events and LOVE Rockford.
