J. HERBERT NELSON TO STEP DOWN
AS STATED CLERK OF THE GENERAL
ASSEMBLY OF THE PC(USA)



After seven years as the chief ecclesial officer of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II, has announced plans to step down from his role as Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the PC(USA) effective June 30, 2023. The decision, he says, came after long conversations with his family and extended time in prayer. The announcement comes just days after he told the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly that he would not seek a third term as Stated Clerk. "I have sought God's will my entire life, following in the footsteps of my father and grandfather to preach the gospel in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) I believe that God calls us into new seasons in our life of discipleship. 
KFACT UPDATES

James and Odette Casimir have recently returned from six weeks in Haiti and report that the greatest request from their community is once again, more garden tools for families in the surrounding areas of Saut-d'Eau. More people will gain food security and grow the local economy! Therefore, this May and June we are again asking our SecondFirst Church Family for donations to support buying more Garden Tools & Heritage Seeds.

Casimir's five acres of gardens are naturally irrigated by run off from the Saut-d'Eau waterfall. Many families work this land and donate a portion of the produce back to James and Odette which they donate to the local food bank. Many families have their own garden plot and now produce extra food to share and sell at the market.

As the local economy grows, transportation of tools, and all the produce becomes important. Their 3 growing seasons require regular trips between neighborhoods, families and the local marketplace.

To facilitate growing the local economy, this thriving community of gardeners need a truck! Kay Blair has just donated her beloved pickup truck to James Casimir who is driving it to Florida as we speak! Her 2000 Dodge Dakota Quad Cab Stick Shift w/ only 128,000 miles was repaired by Doug Phillips and is now PERFECT for Haiti where this age vehicle is easy to repair and where the climate helps these vehicles 'last forever'. Kay's truck will go by barge to Saut-d'Eau this Spring!


STRENGTHEN THE CHURCH PENTECOST OFFERING Sunday, May 28

FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

It comes up every year. EVERY. YEAR. Is it “Jesus Christ is risen today” or “Christ the Lord is risen today”? Since I didn’t really know, I decided to track it down; trace the progression through both the Presbyterian and Congregational/UCC hymnals we have used in the past 80 or so years. My intent was to find the right-est version to make the largest number of people happy while singing this hymn we only get to sing once a year.

There are varying texts of the opening hymn we sing on Easter. Every year there is a debate about which one/s to do. This year, we started with the words “Christ the Lord is risen today,” rather than “Jesus Christ is risen today,” (the version in our hymnal), and did 5 verses, instead of the 4 we have been doing. Here is a brief history of the hymn:

In 1708, an anonymous translation of the poem *Lyra Davidica* was published. “Jesus Christ is risen today” is how it begins. In 1739 Charles Wesley published “Hymn for Easter Day,” in *Hymns and Sacred Poems*, taking inspiration from that three-verse Latin poem. Wesley’s version contained eleven verses. Would you like to sing all eleven? The various hymnals our congregations have used, use different versions, depending on the year published. Interestingly enough, the version in the 1976 PCUSA hymnal *Hymns for the Family of God* is the same as the 1995 *Chalice* version, but the 1990 *The Presbyterian Hymnal* changed to the current version that is found in the 2016 *Glory to God*. There are several minor differences throughout all the versions, but the most important change to me is this:

“Sons of men and angels say:” (The *Pilgrim Hymnal* 1931, and still found in a 1976 hymnal). This was changed to “All creation join to say,” in the *Chalice*, and “Our triumphant holy day,” in the 1990 *The Presbyterian Hymnal*, as well as our 2016 *Glory to God* hymnal.

“Hail the Lord of earth and heaven! Praise to thee by both be given, Thee we greet triumphant now, Hail, the Resurrection thou!” This is the verse that for some reason was taken out of all successive versions. I’m not sure if it was to reduce the number of verses, but I see nothing that needs to be changed there. So we sang it this year.
