Domestic violence and the growing presence of commercial human trafficking are threats to public safety and quality of life in our community. The statistics paint a grim picture: On average, domestic violence accounts for nearly 30 percent of Rockford's violent crime.

In 2016, Illinois ranked eighth in the United States for reported human trafficking cases. The City of Rockford Human Services Department reports that an average of 25 percent of our homeless population were without a residence as a result of domestic violence. **Hope to see you walking on October 1!**

There will not be a trunk or treat this year, but that has given me time, as the children's leader, to think about the message of Halloween. It is an excellent chance to pause and remember that the complex holiday, a mishmash of commercialized joy and gore, could be replaced in our culture with the far more meaningful day of Dia de Los Muertos. The hegemony of Christianity in America can sometimes seep into even progressive minds, and we don't go far enough to consider incorporating other culture's beliefs into our own. Where is Christ on Halloween- in the joy of

childhood, indeed, perhaps too, gore of his death? But we believe God is everywhere, and Jesus came for all. In that case, Christ would point us toward the truth underneath the obsession with spirits and Halloween- a knowledge deep inside our psyche: life lives on when love is present. So this Halloween, if you are reading this, don't ONLY pull out Hocus Pocus 2; instead, watch CoCo, Book of Life, and Day of the Dead: A Celebration of Life. Embrace other languages and cultures, and steep yourself in messages of love and strength, even when giving into secular fun is tempting. While many Christian communities in our country continue to find ways to divide us, sadly, we must follow the parable Christ would call us into. So, we must embrace others and find ways to value God in marginalized places. Happy Dia de Los Muertos!



Overnight Café Story Highlighted in Grant Report



As September begins, we are busy thinking about end-of-summer activities, start of school procedures, and the beautiful autumn days that will soon be here! However, there are also many people in the church who are busy thinking about sub-zero winter temperatures and the people that will come into our church building to seek shelter during this winter's Overnight Cafe. While some are writing grants seeking funding (me!), others are planning for the logistics of the program (Pastor Becky), and others are thinking of ways that they can help make the Overnight Cafe successful (you?).

I wanted to share a special story that was recently highlighted in a grant report for the Community Foundation of Northern Illinois (an organization that has helped to financially support the Overnight Cafe through their Community Grants Program for a number of

It has been wonderful to watch our community rally in support of the Overnight Cafe. The food budget remains surprisingly low because of all the people who have donated food. Three specific examples show this generosity. First, one guest at the Overnight Cafe received VA housing during the program. He was so grateful for the time he had spent at the Overnight Cafe that he decided to sponsor an evening meal as a way of giving back. Next, the Overnight Cafe held a Superbowl party for the guests. The guests were looking forward to the party, and one guest even decided that he would like to pay for the pop at the party. The guests ended up having a great time at this

Superbowl party and several were still talking about it the next day at Carpenter's Place. One visiting volunteer nurse later commented to Pastor Becky, "Fun and shelters don't always mix." Finally, a ten-year-old girl from the community decided that she wanted to forgo presents for her birthday, and she instead donated a meal to the Overnight Cafe. The generosity of the congregation, community members, and the guests themselves is remarkable!

These three scenarios represent only a portion of the positive experiences that take place at the Overnight Cafe every year. I can't wait for the amazing stories that will emerge from the 2024 Overnight Cafe!
